Dear Mother of J.

Dear Mother of "J.": I cannot tell how poignantly I am stirred by the letter you wrote The Grapevine about your alcoholic son. Just ten years ago my own mother, after years of frantic bewilderment, lost hope. Long a chronic problem drinker, I had come to the jumping-off place. A very good doctor had pronounced the grim sentence: "Obsessive drinker, deteriorating rapidly--

hopeless." The doctor used to talk about my case somewhat like this: "Yes, Bill has underlying personality defects. . . great emotional sensitivity, childishness and inferiority. "This very real feeling of inferiority is



magnified by his childish sensitivity and it is this state of affairs which generates in him that insatiable, abnormal craving for self approval and success in the eyes of the world. Still a child, he cries for the moon.

And the moon, it seems, won't have him!

"Discovering alcohol, he found much more in it than do normal folks. To him alcohol is no mere relaxation; it means release--release from inner conflict. It seems to set his troubled spirit free."

The doctor would then go on, "Seen this way, we normal people can picture how such a compulsive habit can become a real obsession; as indeed it has, in Bill's case. Once he arrived at the obsession point, alcohol overshadows all else. Hence he now appears utterly selfish. And immoral. He will lie, cheat, steal or what have you, to serve his drinking ends. Of course those about him are shocked and dismayed because they think his actions are willful. But that's far from being so. The real picture of Bill is that of a bankrupt idealist; one who has gone broke on vain, childish dreams of perfection and power.

Victimized now by his obsession, he is a little boy crying alone in a dark strange room; waiting agonized for mother--or God--to come and light a candle."

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I must confess, Mother of "J.," that I may have put some of these words into the doctor's mouth. But that's the alcoholic's life as I have lived it.

Did I, an alcoholic, have a defective character? Of course I did. Was I, an alcoholic, also a sick man? Yes, very.

To what extent I was personally responsible for my drinking, I don't know. Yet I'm not one to take complete refuge in the idea that I was a sick man only. In earlier years I certainly had some degree of free will. That free will I used badly, to the great misery of my mother and countless others. I am deeply ashamed.

As one who knows me a little, you may have heard how, ten years ago, a friend, himself a liberated alcoholic, came to me bearing the light which finally led me out of the toils. There will come a day like that for you and yours--I'm so confident! As ever,

*W*hen I was 5, my dad had an aneurism. Since I am the youngest of 10 kids, the older girls helped raise me. My mom had to work hard to be the mom and "dad". My dad had to stay at the V.A. Hospital permanently. I didn't know I had any anger. In fact, I don't remember feeling very sad about my daddy. It might have been shock. Though a lot of anger came out later and it was directed at my mom.

We used to have big family parties on Thanksgiving and Christmas. My mom had tiny glasses for us filled with wine. No big deal. In my teenage years, my mom withdrew from me. She partied several days a week, staying out until 2,3 or 4. One of my older brothers partied with one of my sisters. They even locked my mom out when she came home too early. I wouldn't be like them.

My mom was crazy sometimes. She would yell so loud her face became red. I wanted her attention. When she was home, she worked hard at the home office. There were many TV shows she couldn't miss. At times she would literally push me aside if her shows were on and if I was in the way.

Then my sister started to get in a lot of trouble. She and I were the last ones still living at home. She would get grounded, my mom would beat her, and my sister would run away. It all made me scared. So, as I got fantastic grades and behaved myself, I didn't get much attention. My mom was always worrying about my sister. So one day it dawned on me to be "bad" to get attention.

School wasn't very good. I got picked on so much for trying to fit in and doing it wrong. One of my peers felt sorry for me. She looked cool and could teach me to be cool. We had so much fun breaking curfew, stealing our parent's liquor and smoking joints. Me new friend taught me to skip out of school and get away with it. Finally my mom acted concerned. She found me in front of a store after curfew. She even grounded me. Like my sister, I snuck out and ran away. Life was so fun and scary at the same time. I did blame my mom for my mistakes. It probably wasn't the right thing to do.

One day my oldest brother and 2 of my sisters took turns telling me about Jesus and the Bible.

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DCM REPORT JUNE 1st, 2007

Good evening everybody. Our Area 20 **Delegate to New York, Larry Stiff will be joining us tonight.** I will be brief and ask that unless necessary to communicate with this committee that we just turn in our committee reports trying to give Larry the time possible. Dan Michel and I attended the Spring Committee on May 13th, where we helped to set the agenda for the Summer Assembly & Post General Service Conference Report. **This Assembly will be in Waukegan on June 17th**, Info packets and flyers are on the table, I hope that all can attend. **There are two resignations that there will be elections for: 1) Area Literature Chairperson and 2) Area Alternate Chairperson.**

There will be three financial votes:

1) NIA 2006 Budget to allow payment to Al-Anon Family Groups the amount of \$268.85 through an oversight of the2005 Spring Conference Final Financial Report. This is a legitimate debt that should be honored.

2)NIA Budget adjustment of \$2,000.00 be made to Line680 to increase expenses for hosting Area Assemblies.

3)Motion to the Assembly that <u>4 line items</u> be restored to the previous 2005 budgeted amounts.
1) NIA Grapevine Materials Budget Line Item of \$200.00 be established.

2)Make a line item adjustment of \$200.00 to increase the CPC Materials Budget from \$400.00 to \$600.00.

3) Make a line item adjustment of \$1300.00 to the Corrections Materials Budget increasing from \$2,000.00 to \$3,300.00.

4) Make a line item adjustment of \$1,500.00 to the Timely Budget Adjustment, increasing from \$1,000.00 to \$2,500.00.

Budget cuts occurred last year because of a shortfall of contributions, but contributions are up this year and we should spend this money here at home rather than send it away. Details of these items are listed in New Business in the Assembly Agenda in your Assembly packets.

I'm glad that Dan is back here with us, and as we are hosting the Summer Committee Meeting, he will be heading up the planning committee for that event.

I had to admit I did feel empty inside and they said God could fill that. I became so religious that other people were below me. It was hard to make many friends with a "goody two-shoes" attitude. At times I had depression and other times was talking and laughing out of control. Even when teachers said to stop, I would try but couldn't. High school graduation came next.

Being very convinced that God wanted me to me a missionary, I signed up for Bible school a year after high school. I looked down on others who were going to regular college. My goal seemed more important. I didn't drink because it was wrong. During Bible school I had episodes of mania and then depression and finally suicide thoughts and attempts. From the years 1992-1995, I spent a lot of time in Psychiatric hospitals and also was asked to leave Bible school. I moved in with my sister for a year, moved to my mom's house, then started drinking. My attempts to live a sane sober life weren't working, so I quit trying and instead made a decision to "f_" it all.

Bar hopping and meeting all kinds of men brought a lot of excitement to my life. My mom saw me drunk and didn't like it so I tried to be drunk when she wasn't looking or when I was away from home.

Paranoia, anxiety, panic attacks, and other mental relapses started to plague my life. I even called the police on my mom because in my mind, she was going to get violent. Moving is what I did for the next year. A month at one place, 2 months at another place, hospital inpatient, outpatient, move back to mom's, etc. In the middle of all this chaos my future husband and I met at the animal shelter.

Maybe our love of animals drew us together. It's hard to understand how we ended up together because I was in no mental state to become married. God had other plans.

Pregnancy caused me to move in with the father of my baby and future husband. I had just been fired from 2 jobs in a row and started permanent disability from social security. My life was such a mess. Pregnancy didn't do much to help my mood. Since being another divorce statistic didn't appeal to me, I fought against the idea of getting married. This is what the pastor said to me: "You should just have the baby by yourself. You aren't married and since you are a Christian and he isn't one, I would advise you not to marry." Our parents thought we should. So I asked God and didn't get a voice in my head or anything, but I did feel an unmistakable peace after meditating and praying about it.

Drinking wasn't a part of my life until one day my husband's step mom said "Before you start nursing, have a glass of wine." Beer was close enough, wasn't it? And a few were better than just one. I started to feel more alone and have more rage. At that time I drank, but not so much. I quit drinking when pregnant for the second time. Every night I stayed up worrying about having another baby. I cried, yelled at God, feeling trapped most of the time. After my second daughter was born, I really started losing my mind.


A nearby church hired me as a volunteer, yet I was thinking they were plotting against me and my kids. Then a psychiatrist prescribed some medication. The next 5 years were spent trying to figure out what was wrong with me. I drank sometimes, having many fits of rage, depression and bewilderment. Why wasn't God and my church helping me? Maybe it was time to get divorced and take the kids to my mom's house, I thought. Maybe my earlier sins were being punished. I wondered if I would ask God to forgive me then He would stop "punishing" me. Nothing helped, even when other people prayed for me. Living my life felt like torture. A church counselor started helping me.

At one point I was so full of rage that I threw my daughter down on the floor. DCFS had to come over to interview us. Parenting classes were assigned to me. A twelve step called Emotions Anonymous started to help a little. My church counselor listened to my 5th step. Every now and then I wished that I could go to AA, knowing that I didn't drink enough for that.

Actually my drinking got heavier. I drank several different kinds of drinks, but beer was my drink of choice. There was a drinking schedule. At first there was only drinking on the weekends. Then I had a drinking day during the week. And since there was one drinking day, why not have 2? It progressed to drinking every other day. I kept adding one more beer to the amount. In order to please my husband, I only drank at night. He didn't want the kids to see. But I could have just 1 or 2 if my husband wasn't home. If he asked, I would lie about it. My daughter said she remembers me drinking a whole 12 pack, even though I tried to hide it from them.

There were 3 different grocery stores and 3 different liquor stores that I juggled my purchases from.

 They MAY not even finish the inventory."



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I couldn't go to the same store too many times or they might know how much I was buying. Some of the cashiers started to recognize me and wouldn't ask for ID anymore, even though I looked young. Something I didn't do was make eye contact so that people wouldn't notice who was buying all this beer.

Drinking got me so sick that I saw double. I tried to make it better by closing one eye, which made me dizzy. And being dizzy made the room spin, which made me want to throw up. So I prayed and prayed not to throw up. Didn't work... Many times I blacked out. Sometimes I wet myself. I came to and always had a hangover, which made me loathe living. It was so painful but I didn't know how to make it better. I tried to figure it out so many times.

When I had enough, I started to ask my husband if I was an alcoholic. He went to AA for so long, he must know. But instead of answering me, he brought me a pamphlet that asked me questions. My drinking wasn't over even after trying 2 AA meetings, because I couldn't say that word: Alcoholic.

One night, I was drinking a caffeinated drink, trying to get drunk. I stayed up all night crying and asked God to help me. Being sick of feeling terrible and sick of the way I treated my family, I asked my husband for help the next morning. He called 2 ladies to come take me to a Saturday night AA meeting. They told me to notice how I felt after the meeting and I did feel better.

For six months, I was dry, not sober. Sober is living each day as it comes and living with some serenity. My family suffered for it too. It was difficult to believe that I was worse without my alcohol.

Though it seemed like things would be better after I quit drinking, things got more difficult. Good thing it didn't stay that way. But I did end up in a psychiatric hospital which saved my life. I was going crazy without alcohol and thought my family and everyone else would be better without me. My plan was to buy a gun and end it all. I told my husband I was leaving and had some things packed just to fool him. God had other plans. Finally my doctor was contacted and I got some help. I wish that my story suddenly got better from there, but I drank again for several months.

On New Year's Eve, AA was having their sober parties. My husband asked if we could go. My plan was to go for a couple of minutes then go back home to my beer. At the party, there were people that I used to see at meetings. For sure I thought they would judge me, but they smiled and hugged me.

Nobody asked why I was drinking again, even though they knew. Almost 2 more weeks went by and those alcoholics did mess up my drinking! I came back to the meetings and was welcomed too. It was difficult to lift my head again and not be ashamed. Though I am so very grateful those AA's messed with my drinking, because everyday I needed a drink at that point.

When I was so humiliated and willing to do anything to stay sober, then the program worked for me. When people shared at meetings, I listened. When someone suggested I do something like make phone calls, I did. When I was told to get a higher power, I did. That is what got me sober and is what keeps me sober. To be willing to do things I don't want to do, but things that are good for me. I made new friends and AA people have become my new family.

There is a lot more I could add to this story. Like how AA helped me to forgive my mom and my sisters and brothers. Or how I had spiritual awakenings after working some of the twelve steps. The flowers looked more beautiful than ever and I didn't even remember my yard having flowers! In the fall the trees looked so much more colorful and the snow sparkled in the winter. I was starting to have some serenity. Life kept happening and I became apart of it. Problems happen and other AA members help me through. And God is becoming more important to me. Now I can live my life and help others find their way too.



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
